Officers and police civilian staff, firefighters and

Over the past several years we have all worked hard to make the Public Safety Departments an integrated part of this wonderful community. By so doing we feel that we are establishing a working relationship with the citizens that make them feel comfortable in coming to us for help and assistance. We spend many hours each year meeting with the public, giving presentations and talking to them about our various areas of expertise. The police department gave well over 100 public presentations this year on topics such as personal safety, awareness of local laws and ordinances, neighborhood awareness, crime prevention and drug awareness.

Growth and technological advancements are rapidly changing the way we do business. Unprecedented growth has placed an enormous demand on the resources of the Public Safety Departments. Each department has been asked to do more with less and has responded well.

During the past year significant strides have taken place with technological advancement. Just over a year ago, through many administrators coming together, we purchased a public safety computer program and necessary software to bring almost every jurisdiction in Utah County together on a shared computer system. Technological advancements are sometimes expensive, however, this sharing of information greatly enhances our abilities to track criminals and monitor criminal activities. It also improves officer safety and allows for uniformed patrol officers to spend more time in the field.

We as a community are fortunate to have the quality of dedicated men and women that we have in the public safety departments with whom I am so very proud to be associated.

Division Commander

Lieutenant Adams oversees and supervises those employees involved in this division. They include: Animal Control, secretaries and crossing guards. He works closely with the Chief of Police to oversee the operations of the office and the department. Lt. Adams also serves as the department Public Information Officer. As PIO he works as the liaison between the department and the media. He works to keep the public informed when needs arise.

The Administrative Division provides services to the public as well as support and information necessary for the other divisions to carry out their duties.

Animal Control

The Animal Control Officer for Spanish Fork is Mark Byers. He responded to 703 calls for service in 2006. These calls include anything that has to deal with any type of animal. Officer Byers was instrumental in helping to establish the South Utah Valley Animal Shelter. This relocated the County Animal Shelter from Provo to an area near the new Utah County Jail in Spanish Fork. This has greatly cut down on the time that Officer Byers had been spending driving to and from the old animal shelter delivering animals. The Shelter also took over the animal licensing for the south end of the county. Spanish Fork City no longer issues animal licenses.

Information Services

In conjunction with Utah County cities, with the exception of Provo, our department began using new computer software. We began using this program on August 1, 2005. The Spillman program enables all jurisdictions involved to share their database information with other agencies. Criminals move freely from place to place. This helps us track their comings and goings in an effort to curb crime in our community.

Department Secretaries

The department employs two full time and two part time secretaries. They assist citizens coming in to or calling the office. Together they have a variety of duties such as:

- Answering phone calls
- Assisting citizens in the office
- Filing and maintaining reports
- Maintaining traffic school records
- Transcribing statements

Brad Stone, Division Commander

Overview of Division

The Investigative Division is changing. We are investigating more felony cases than we have in the past. There are a few areas in particular that the increase has been marked. These cases include sex crimes and computer crimes. These cases often require considerable investigative time as well as coordination with additional agencies.

The Investigations Division remains very optimistic and motivated in our law enforcement efforts. We have very dedicated officers who are always willing to respond to the call of duty at any time and any situation. They are well trained and knowledgeable in how to conduct the wide variety of cases they are called upon to investigate. Most of all, they are good, honorable officers who reflect the high values of the Spanish Fork Police Department and Spanish Fork City.

Division Commander

Lt. Stone is the Division Commander and directly supervises the Detective Sergeant. He is responsible for assigning cases to the detectives for follow up investigation and monitoring their performance and quality of work. He manages scheduling and training for the detectives to make sure they have the necessary skills to function properly and makes sure department policies and procedures are complied with. He also assists in major investigations.

Division Sergeant

Sgt. Anderson recently transferred into the division from patrol and directly supervises four detectives. He carries a caseload of active investigations. He has served in other capacities such as Major Crimes and as a Patrol Sergeant that have given him experience to draw from and lead others.

Det. Jackson is a very experienced detective. In addition to numerous hours of training to enhance his general investigative skills, he has received extensive specialized training in investigating violations of sexual exploitation of children over the internet. He has been successful in identifying sexual predators. He participates in a federally funded task force for that purpose. He also carries a full load of active cases which are mostly felonies.

Utah County Major Crime Task Force Officer

Det. Gardner recently transferred into the division from patrol and took over the assignment to participate in the Utah County Major Crimes Task Force. The primary function of this group is to target illegal drug use and trafficking and closely related crimes that are often associated with drug abuse. When Det. Gardner was working for Mapleton Police Department he was assigned to work in the Task Force. This is Det. Gardner's second time in this assignment. He offers much experience and knowledge to junior officers assigned to the Task Force.

School Resource Officer

Det. Johnson is assigned primarily as our school resource officer. He teaches a law enforcement class at Spanish Fork High School and assists the administration and staff with problems that arise on campus not only at Spanish Fork High School, but also Landmark High School, American Leadership Academy, Spanish Fork Junior High, Spanish Fork Middle School and occasionally at the elementary schools. He helps provide a security presence in

the school as well as enforcing laws and investigating offenses that occur on campus. In addition to his school activities, he is also assigned cases requiring general investigation. He has also been tasked to coordinate with Utah County Health personnel in monitoring local retail outlets for tobacco and alcohol sales compliance. He too is trained and works with the federally funded task force against internet sexual predators.

Drug Enforcement Officer

Det. Nielsen is assigned as the Spanish Fork drug enforcement officer. His assignment includes enforcement of drug laws, educating the citizens of Spanish Fork in drug recognition and providing information on available resources for parents in identifying signs of drug abuse and assisting them in resolving abuse situations they may be faced with in their family settings while still focusing on the need to protect the community at large. To help him accomplish this task Det. Nielsen has prepared and provided presentations in numerous settings, including church, school and support groups. He gave 11 presentations in 2006. He made 99 drug related arrests.

PATROL DIVISION

Carl Johnston, Patrol Lieutenant

Overview of Division

The Patrol Division has some of the best and brightest personnel that a city could have. They are people of the highest integrity and they love the people they serve. They have a passion to do the right thing in all cases. They go out of their way to help the citizens in our city. They have pride in the uniform that they wear and try at all times to bring honor to the uniform and to the City of Spanish Fork.

Division Sergeants

The Patrol Division has three Sergeants. From January to October they were Brandon Anderson, Brad Mitchell and Cory Slaymaker. Richard Hales was put into the patrol division in October. Brandon Anderson was rotated into the Investigation Division. Two of the Sergeants supervise four officers and the other Sergeant supervises five officers.

Car per Officer Program

The Patrol Division uses a car per officer program. This has proven to be a great tool in the effective response to emergency calls. This becomes both a benefit to the officers as well as the citizens in the community. Officers can use the cars for personal use within the city limits but they have to be willing to respond to emergency calls for service. During the past year off-duty officers have responded to emergency calls on at least 16 occasions. The cars are parked at the officers homes giving increased police presence to neighborhoods.



Traffic School

Traffic School both at the department and on line have been a great success.



The school is very educational and public relation minded. These classes are a very valuable tool. It provides officers a one on one contact with the people who live in the community. It creates a rapport with citizens as well as educates them on defensive driving skills. By attending traffic school the violator is keeping the violation from being recorded on their permanent driving record. In 2006, 52 traffic school classes were taught. Those classes included 1389 people attending.

In addition to our live classes 410 people took the online traffic course.

DARE

DARE is currently taught at the following schools: Park, Brockbank, Rees, Larsen, Canyon, East Meadows, Spanish Oaks, and ALA. The DARE Officers assigned to the schools this year are: Justin Gordon, Zack Adams, Chris Sheriff and John Jackson. These officers build ties to the children that they teach about drugs, esteem building, peer pressure and "how to say no". These ties last far beyond when the children are in school.

Pedestrian Enforcement

The Patrol Division has worked hard on the enforcement of the pedestrian laws on Main Street. Many enforcement campaigns have been held during the warmer months. We only had one auto/pedestrian accident on Main Street last year and it was involving a bike. The bike rider was at fault in that accident. It appears that our enforcement effort is making Main Street a safer place for pedestrians who are attempting to cross the street.

Traffic Officer

The traffic officer has been a great thing for the Patrol Division. It allows the department to use one person to strictly focus on the traffic issues that are constantly occurring around the town. We have seen an increase in the number of moving citations that have been issued. This has had a direct effect on being able to target specific areas at specific times. The traffic officer assignment is made by the Sergeants for a four month period and one of the line officers fill that assignment.



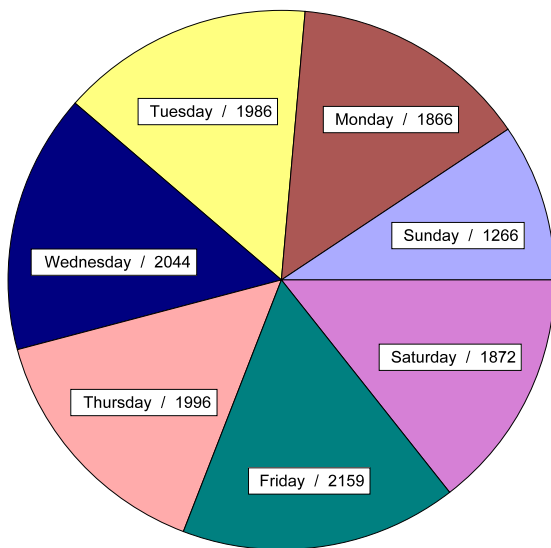
DEPARTMENT STATISTICS

Calls for Service

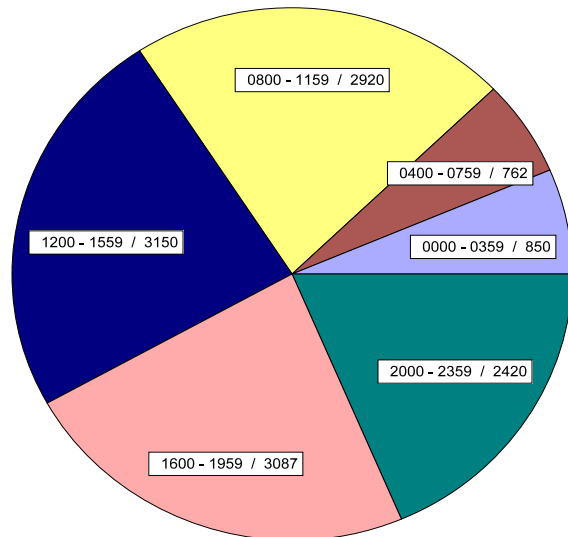
A call for service is a request for assistance from someone in the community. Most calls handled by the department are calls for service as opposed to crime calls. These may include: helping a motorist, fingerprinting, civil problems, accident reports and public presentations. The majority of the officer's time is spent on these types of calls.

During the year officers handled an average of 36 calls for service per day. Along with those calls approximately 23,000 telephone calls are accepted by the secretaries this year.

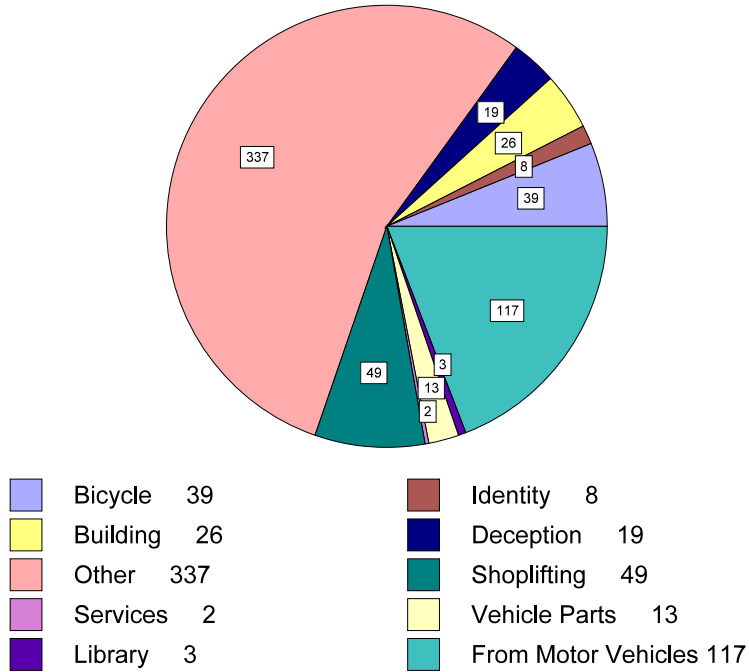

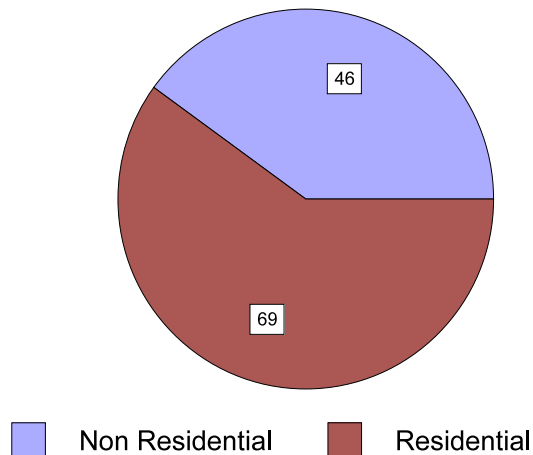

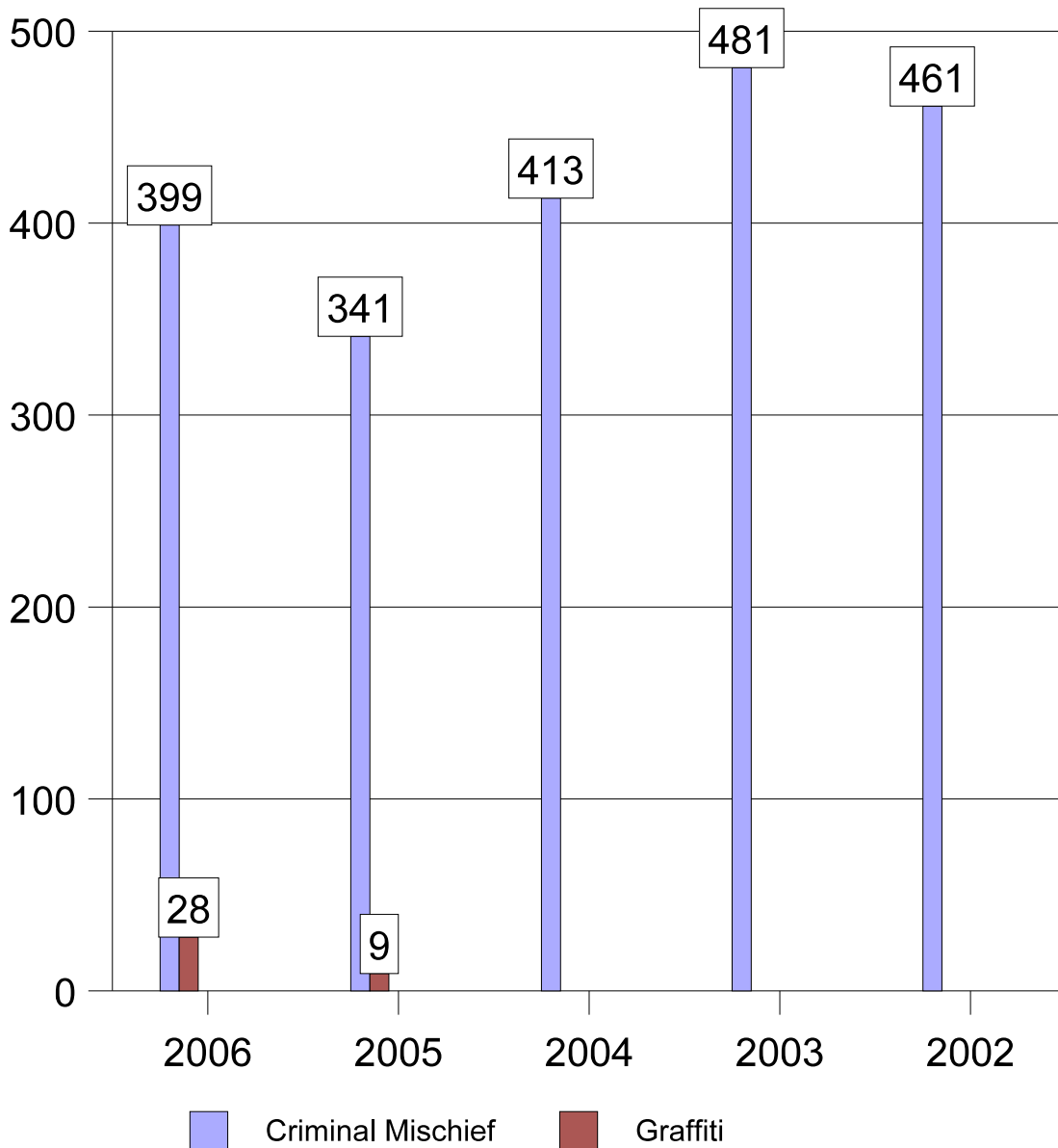

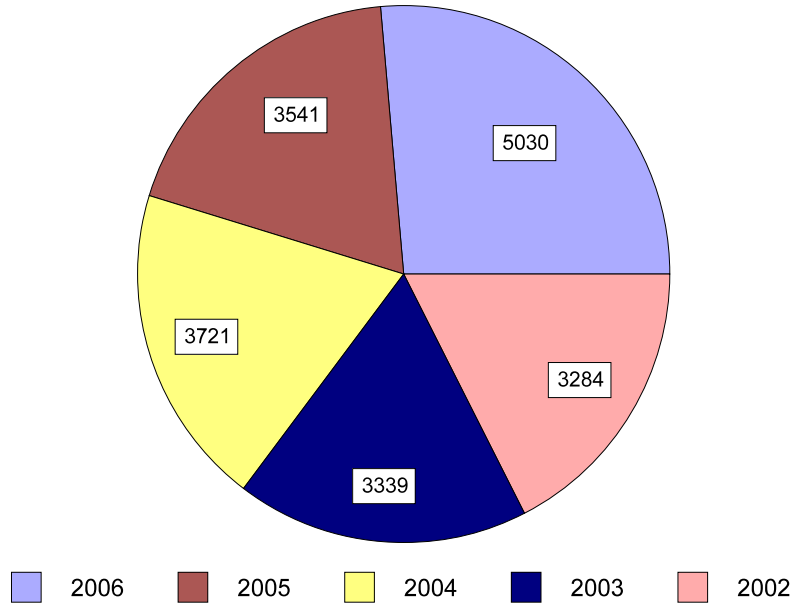

Criminal Mischief/Graffiti Comparison

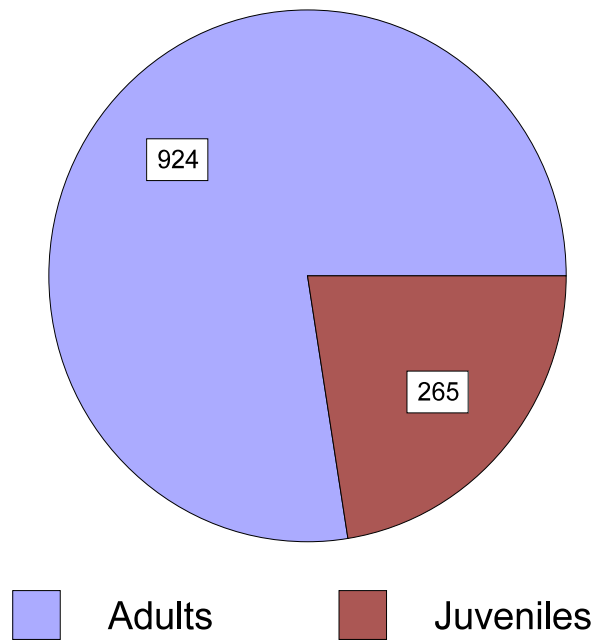

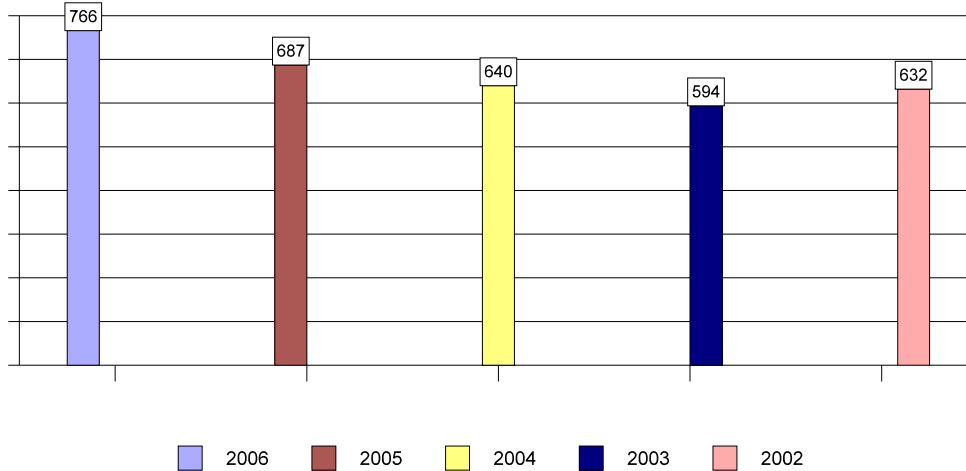

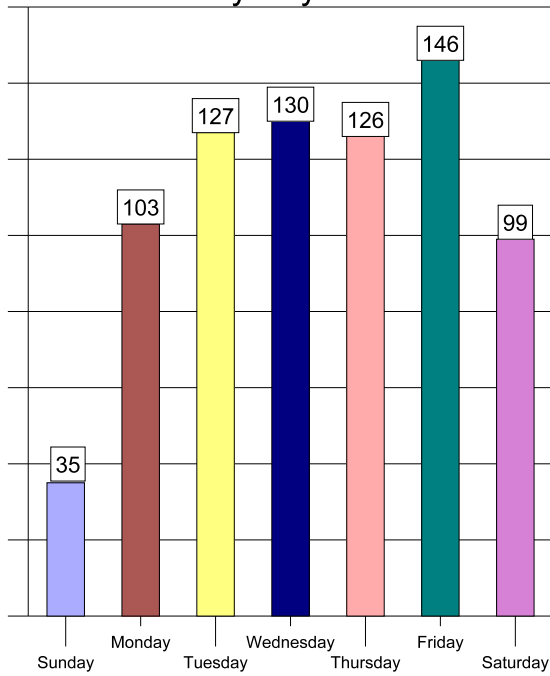
Traffic Accident Comparison by Year



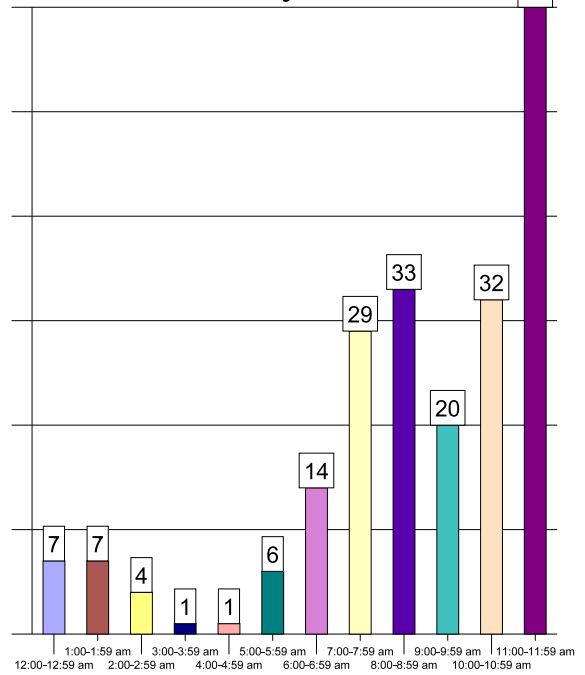

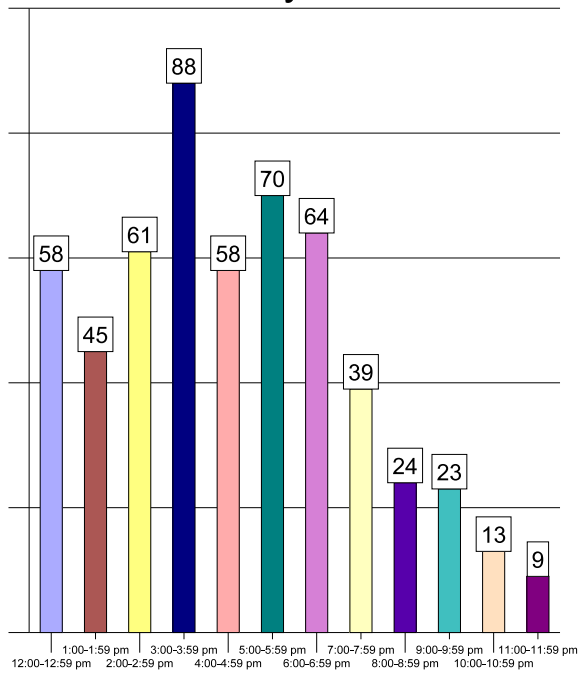
Accidents by Day of the Week



Accidents by AM Hours

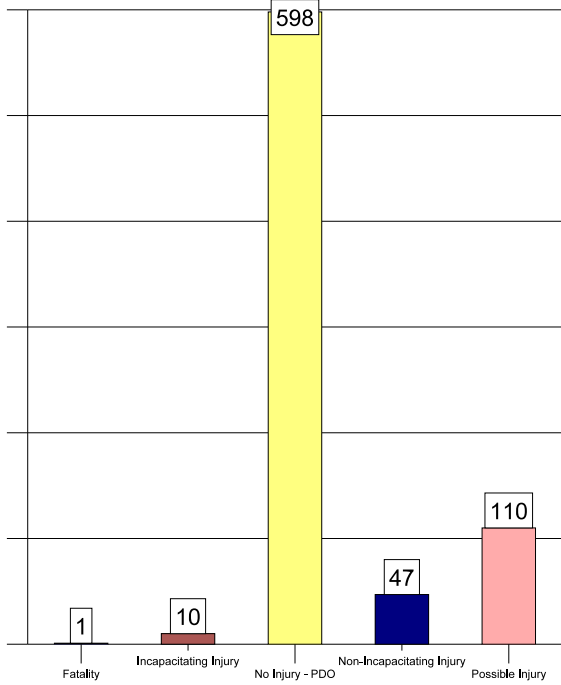


Accidents by PM Hours

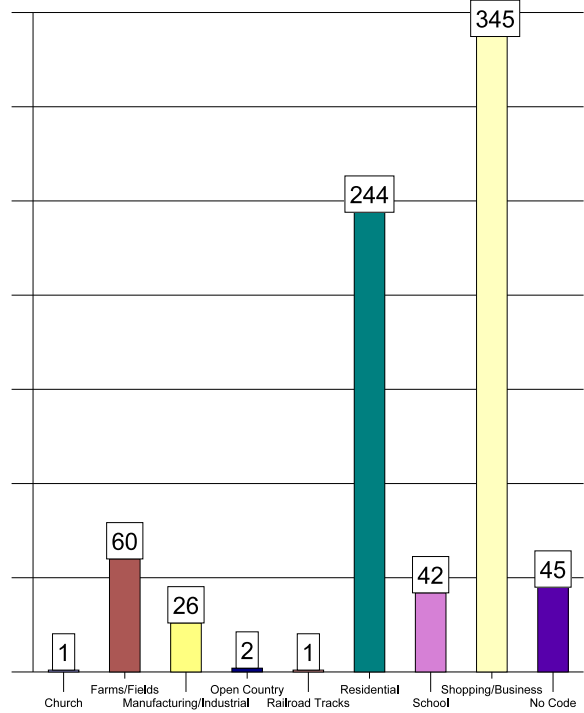

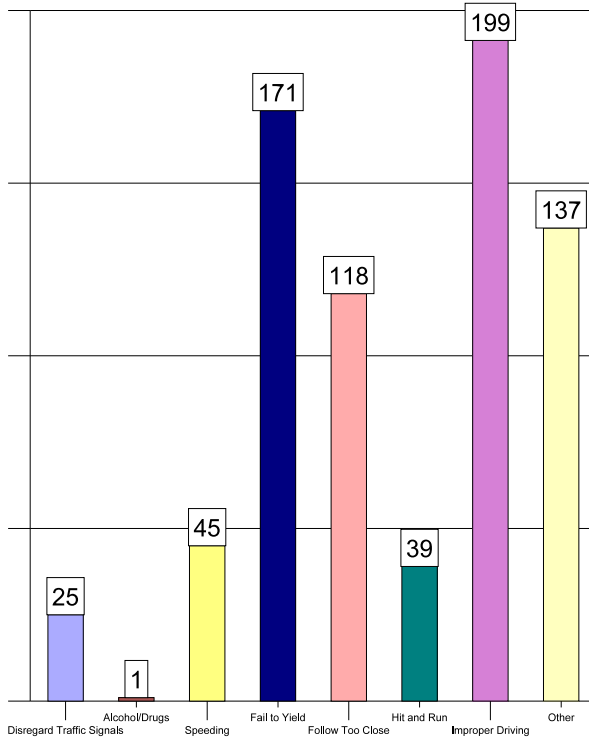
Accidents by Severity

Morgan Warner Retires



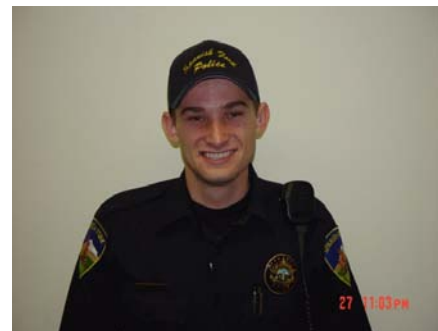
