Fire Hydrants

The City recently underwent an ISO insurance rating that included a random survey of fire hydrants. As inspectors and City crews randomly checked hydrants throughout the City, they found a number of hydrants that were partially or even fully covered.

It is important that all fire hydrants be clear from shrubs and other obstructions to ensure access by fire crews. A safe measure is to be sure that there is **at least** 5 feet of access around the entire hydrant. This access will allow fire fighters to take caps off, walk around hydrants, take hoses around them, etc. Allowing clear access does not necessarily mean



the hydrant must stand alone and be an eye-sore in the landscaping, however, wise planning will ensure a beautiful landscape and access.

If you have a hydrant in your front yard and it is hidden by the landscaping, please take the time to clear the obstructions so that fire crews will be able to access them in the event of an emergency. Remember, that every minute counts to successfully fight a fire and precious moments can be lost searching for a buried hydrant. Take this fall to Adopt your hydrant and clean it up if necessary. If you have questions regarding hydrant maintenance, contact the water department at 798-5050.



Entrance to SF City at I-15

The City has received a number of calls during the past year asking if the City plans to improve and beautify the entrance to the City at the I-15 off ramp and Main Street. The short answer to this questions is, "Yes." The long answer is that we must wait and work with the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) because they have plans to change that intersection within the next few years. In order not to spend money on an entrance that may be widened or reconfigured in a few years, the City will wait to work in cooperation with UDOT, maximizing the money spent on the entrance. The City did try to provide minimal improvements to the area by planting grass seeds and putting in a sprinkling system. Although these minor improvements don't complete the project, in a few years, the area should be completed and worthy of being an entrance into our community.

More Convenient Ways to Pay Utility Bills

Spanish Fork City already offers a convenient online Utility Bill Payment program and is pleased to announce a new Operator Assisted Payment Line. As a way to offer more choices to pay your utility bill, Spanish Fork City now allows you to pay your bill over the phone. This is an integrated service, provided by Xpress Bill Pay, the same company that provides the Online Bill Pay feature.

Both services are easy to use. First, if you wish to pay online, visit www.XpressBillPay.com, and login to your account. There you can see up to a full year's history of your account and can compare current bills to a year ago. It will also send a reminder e-mail each billing period to let you know when your bill is online and available for payment. Then you just log in to your account at Xpress-BillPay.com and view your bill.

If you choose the Operator Assisted Payment Line, dial **1-800-720-6847** and a friendly customer service agent will handle the entire process for you. You can pay with credit card, debit card, or electronic funds transfer from checking or savings. We can even setup automatic payments that will pay the account balance on a specified day each month.

October is Fire Safety Month

October is National Fire Safety month and the Spanish Fork City Fire Department encourages all residents to look around their homes to identify and eliminate potential fire hazards. Also, remember to change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. This should be done once a year and a helpful tip is to do this on a special date, such as your birthday, new years, day light savings change, etc. Another smoke alarm tip is vacuum out the dust in the alarms as well. Dust and other debris may cause the alarm to malfunction and could create a potential hazard for your family.

The Spanish Fork Fire Department will host a fire prevention evening at the Fire Station on **Wednesday, October 10th from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm**. The station will be open to the public, children will be able to try on fire turnouts and check out the trucks. There will also be plenty of fire fighters on hand to answer any safety questions you may have.
